Upon successful completion of this course, within the following content areas, the student will be able to:

#### 1. Historical aspects of social welfare policy

describe the relationship between economics, politics, and the formation of Canadian social policy throughout history identify the relationship between marginalized/oppressed groups and policy structures which have limited access to services critically analyze social policy based on social work values identify the role of the social worker in the formation and delivery of Canadian social policy describe the reciprocal relationship between the formation of public opinion, media, and larger social forces

### 2. Poverty

describe "relative" and "absolute" definitions of poverty research and interpret poverty statistics describe the social, psychological and economic impact of poverty describe the process of income assistance delivery in British Columbia, including basic legislation and client eligibility.

#### 3. Impact of culture and oppression on the practice of social work

describe what is meant by structural, feminist, and First Nations' social work describe how racism, sexism, heterosexism, and ageism produce attitudes and policies which sustain inequalities in society

demonstrate knowledge of anti-oppressive social work to empower and validate the individual
